Speaker Biographies



Dr Priscilla Mensah

Priscilla Mensah is the Acting Senior Director: Office of International Education and is also Director: Research Development at Nelson Mandela University. The Directorate contributes to an enabling environment for research by supporting emerging researchers (which includes postdoctoral and research fellows), facilitating all aspects of postgraduate student funding and offering development programmes for staff and postgraduate students. Through the Unit for statistical consultation, it offers training and consultation for statistical needs of researchers. It also manages ethics processes at the institution.

Prior to joining Mandela University, she was Director in the Human and Infrastructure Capacity Development Directorate of the National Research Foundation (NRF). She held several positions at the University of the Free State including Deputy-Director: International Academic Programmes and Deputy Director of the Postgraduate School. She served as Director for the three consecutive summer schools of the Southern African Young Scientist Summer Programme (SA-YSSP) in Applied Systems Analysis hosted at the University of the Free State from 2012-2015. A key research output from this programme was the book Systems Analysis Approach for Complex Global Challenges, published by Springer in 2018 and for which she was Managing Editor. She has extensive knowledge of South Africa's Higher Education and Training landscape and the National System of Innovation. She is a specialist in systems analysis with specific emphasis on science and policy within South Africa and beyond.

She holds Masters and Doctoral degrees in Chemistry from the University of Cape Town.

Syden part of the Eastern Cape body of experts and stakeholders consulted by Statistics South Africa on various surveys and Census of Commercial Agriculture as well as General Census.

His roles have included conceptualization of research hypothesis, study designs, sample size estimations, sampling, study implementation, statistical analysis and writing manuscripts and grant applications. As an academic, Kennedy Otwombe has more than 130 peer reviewed academic publications in the field of public health, teaches and supervises postgraduate student research and is an editor for Pharmaceutical Statistics Journal. He is also involved in several international health research networks conducting infectious and non-infectious disease research.



Dr Nolunkcwe Bomela

Dr Nolunkcwe Bomela is a Research Associate with the Department of Public Management and Leadership at Nelson Mandela University and former Director of the Department of Research Management at the same institution.
